Support the work of the Women's Safety Worker within the Integrated Domestic Abuse Programme	Essex Probation	Mar 2014	Funding from the CSP contributes to the provision of the Women Safety Officer (WSO) posts. The WSO contacts all women who are known as current partners or ex-partners of men referred by the courts to attend an Integrated Domestic Abuse Programme (IDAP). Contact continues over the life of the programme, which lasts for 27 weeks, and contact may be extended for a further six months. The role of the WSO is to: • inform women about the IDAP programme and ensure that the perpetrator does not shift blame in representing its content and its messages. • raise awareness of what constitutes abuse and to assist women make decisions away from abuse. • complete a full risk assessment of the woman in her current situation and keep this updated with changes in circumstance. • represent the victim perspective in the Multi Agency Arrangements (MAPPA /and or MARAC) and to make referrals to MARAC when the risk is high or very high. • assist woman to consider her and her children's safety and access further available safety measures. • assist woman to access other resources available in the community. • maintain contact with the woman and update them on any risk issues which arise from the work with the perpetrator. It is not intended for the WSO role to go beyond this level of support. However, when necessary our WSOs will provide additional support.

Raise awareness and support victims of Domestic Abuse	CBC	Sep 2013	 To link in with National DA Awareness Week and Essex DA Awareness Week, a multi-agency awareness raising event was held in Colchester Town Centre or September 2013. 8 agencies participated and approx 500 members of the public were issued with advice and leaflets, with approx 250 trolley coins containing the helpline numbers for both women and men issued To The awareness event was supported by a 'mirror sticker' campaign, which was launched on 25th November (International End Violence Against Women Day), where approx 184 agencies (such GP surgeries, dentist, hospitals, health centres, community centres and schools to name a few) were contacted and asked to display mirror stickers in their toilets (both male and female) in order to raise 						

		 awareness and make the public aware of who to contact for help/advice. Approx 900 stickers were issued Sanctuary Scheme operational despite disruption due to Essex Police undergoing a huge change in referral procures in order to adopt a county wide approach. To date, sanctuary rooms or increased security/target hardening has been installed into s approx 24 properties in Colchester (including CBC/CBH, private rented and privately owned properties). A new information sheet about the scheme has been produced which will be available on the CBC website and has already been sent to Essex Police DAST (as the majority of referrals are from this source). An education package and presentation around raising awareness of DA in teenage relationships was developed for delivery into secondary schools across Colchester from September 2013. The sessions are being delivered in various methods; to year 8 students as part of the ACE 'Reducing Risk' road shows, via the schools Youth Health Champion campaigns (delivered by year 10 students) and as part of the One Punch session and other education sessions/assemblies delivered by Essex Police (covering years 7 through to year 11). Due to a lack of suitable rescue centres, kennels or catteries for immediate housing, shortage and issue around recruitment of suitable fosterers and high costs have meant the pet fostering project is no longer feasible; hence it has been agreed that the funding will be used to fund an alternative project which will aim to tackle reducing domestic abuse.

Purple Flag Status was awarded to the borough. It is the accreditation scheme that recognises excellence in the management of town and city centres at night. Purple Flag aims to raise standards and improve the quality of towns and cities at night. Colchester will formally receive its accreditation, which lasts for one year, in July 2013. An

CSP Partners	improvement plan based on assessments of the night time economy will be the focus of activity over the next year. On 1st December a Night of Action was held in the town centre to provide a high visibility presence and reassurance for those using the Town Centre on a Saturday evening. Some of the enforcement activity that took place included: 9 arrests, 4 Acceptable Behaviour Contracts issued, 13 Section 27 'Direction to Leave' notices issued and 15 premises inspected by CBC licensing team. Operation Argus (Counter Terrorism Initiative) was delivered in February 2014 in the Town Hall, Colchester. This event was for the premises involved in the night time economy and was attended by over 20 of these, with many sending more than 1 member of staff. CBC Licensing supports the use of the polycarbonate vessels but can only work within the parameters of the law and cannot apply retrospective conditions on bars. However if regular incidents involving injuries with glass occur, police can call for a review of the licence. Essex Police Licensing also fully supports the use of the vessels, but has encountered some fairly hostile resistance when this subject has been brought up previously at Pub-Watch meetings. Over the last year, Police (Licensing) have recorded four incidents where a glass was used and another four involving glass bottles; fortunately none of these incidents appear to have involved serious injury, and were all recorded as ABH. Both CBC and Police Licensing support the suggestion of using a bar to 'pilot' the use of the polycarbonate vessels and Yates has been suggested they are looking to refurbish in an attempt to attract a

more family orientated clientele and extend hours, so offers a good opportunity to discuss the possibility of using polycarbonates as a condition or as a voluntary agreement, possibility of SCP funding to carry out a trial.

Open Road commenced delivering this newly funded role in mid October 2013 by deploying a Colchester Town 'Street Drinkers Outreach' worker. As this role had not existed before this presented us with a number of exciting challenges and opportunities to work with a cohort of people who were struggling with their addictions to alcohol, the affects upon their daily lives, the environments they were drinking within and the impact upon the residents in the town centre community. We initially identified a number of important objectives that we needed to achieve in order to implement and establish the delivery of this project.

The first of these were:

- To identify Hotspots where the Street Drinkers were gathering,
- To establish partnerships with other agencies who knew these locations and the issues that the local communities were facing.
- To also identify those agencies that were already working with Street drinkers.
- To raise awareness of the new role with Street drinkers, develop a working relationship with them.

A further critical objective was to establish a professional relationship with the existing Street Drinkers. We were already very aware that this cohort of people would be very suspicious and resistant to a person they had not known before trying to access their community and gain their trust and challenge their behaviours.

Where a person has been found breaching the injunction for the first time he/she received a "signpost" card, a copy of the injunction and a map of the area covered by the injunction. The person's details are taken and placed on a database.

A second breach of the injunction results in the same action as above, but includes a direct referral to an alcohol outreach worker or homeless team member. This is to provide continual support for the offender.

A third breach of the injunction will result in consideration of committal proceedings.

Currently an application for committal proceedings has been made against 2 male persons who have breached the injunction on 3 occasions. Court date is awaited.

Figures obtained from police indicate that warnings are being given as agreed in the protocol.

Some of the activity that took place included: 8 arrests, 3 direction to leave notices issued, 6 'stop and search' carried out, 10 FPN's issued for littering and 7 licensed premises were visited to check licensing conditions, food, health & safety legislation and smoke free compliance. A passive drugs dog was in operation with officers at entrances to bars and 'amnesty bins' were available for disposing of drugs.
