The Committee will usually convene immediately following the conclusion of the Strategic Overview and Scrutiny Panel.

The Committee deals with

The review and scrutiny of decisions made, or other actions taken, in connection with the discharge by the responsible authorities of their crime and disorder functions, and to make reports and recommendations to the Council or the Cabinet with respect to the discharge of those functions.

The role of the Crime and Disorder Committee

The Committee shall meet to review or scrutinise decisions or other actions taken in connection with the functions conferred to the Committee, these being, a strategy for the reduction of crime and disorder in the Borough and a strategy for combating the misuse of drugs in the borough.

The Committee has to meet at least once in every twelve month period.

The Committee may co-opt persons to serve on the Committee who are members of the public, employees, officers or members of responsible authorities, for example, the Council, Essex County Council, Essex Police Authority, Essex Fire and Rescue Authority and the Essex Probation Service. Executive members of the Council may not be co-opted to the Committee. Coopted persons shall not be entitled to vote on any matter, unless the Committee so determines.

The work of the Crime and Disorder Committee

An annual review of the Safer Colchester Partnership Strategy will be a year on year substantive report to be considered by the Committee.

Any Member of Colchester Borough Council may give written notice to the Scrutiny Officer (on behalf of the Head of Corporate Services) that they wish an item to be included on the agenda of the Committee in relation to a local crime and disorder matter. If the matter is considered a local crime and disorder matter, the item will be included on the first available agenda of the Committee.

A crime and disorder matter is a matter involving anti-social behaviour or other behaviour adversely affecting the local environment, or the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances.

The Committee once it has considered a local crime and disorder matter shall consider whether or not to make a report to the Cabinet or Council, and if it decides not to, shall notify the Councillor concerned of its decision(s) and the reason(s) for it.

If the Committee decides to report to the Cabinet or Council, it will provide a copy of the report to the Councillor concerned and the responsible authorities and co-operating persons or bodies as appropriate.

An interest is considered to be prejudicial if a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard it as so significant that it is likely to prejudice the Councillor's judgement of the public interest.

Councillors should consult paragraph 7 of the Meetings General Procedure Rules for further guidance.

1. Crime and Disorder

RESOLVED that the committee:

- i) Noted the Home Office Guidance for the scrutiny of Crime and Disorder matters enclosed in the agenda as a background paper.
- ii) Noted the Developing Overview and Scrutiny event to be held in the Town Hall the following evening and that would include discussions on Councillor Calls for Action and issues in regards to crime, disorder and anti social behaviour.

Councillors Barlow, Harris, Maclean, Pyman and Taylor (in respect of being Members of their local Neighbourhood Action Panel) all declared a personal interest in the following item.

Councillor Sykes (in respect of being a member of her local Neighbourhood Action Panel and Member of the Stanway Parish Council) declared her personal interest in the following item.

Councillors Hogg and Chuah (in respect of being members of their local Neighbourhood Action Panel, and Trustees of St Anne's Community Hall Association) both declared a personal interest in the following item.

Councillor J Young (in respect of being a Member of her local Neighbourhood Action Panel, a Member of Essex County Council, and her spouse being the Portfolio Holder for Community Safety, a Member of the Essex Probation Board, and a Member of the Responsible Authorities Group) declared her personal interest in the following item.

Councillor T Young (in respect of being a Member of his local Neighbourhood Action Panel, a Member of the Essex Probation Board, and a Member of the Responsible Authorities Group, and his spouse being a Member of Essex County Council) declared his personal interest in the following item. Chief Superintendent Tim Newcomb and Superintendent Jason Gwillim, both of Colchester and Tendring Police, Councillor Tim Young, Portfolio Holder responsible for Community Safety and Mr. Ian Vipond, Executive Director and Chair of the CCDRP Responsible Authorities Group, all attended the meeting for this item.

2. Colchester Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership

Mr. Ian Vipond introduced the report on the work and progress of the Colchester Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership.

Chief Superintendent (CS) Newcomb addressed the committee to explain the role of Tendring and Colchester Police in relation to the Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership.

CS Newcomb explained how Colchester was meeting its Crime and Disorder targets including:

Criminal damage had reduced by 9% to date in 2009-10.

Violent crime had reduced by 7.5% to date in 2009-10.

Dwelling Burglary had reduced by 11% to date in 2009-10, with 31 fewer victims in burglary, and an excellent result of 64% detection rate.

Offset against this, it was noted that:

Burglary in commercial premises had risen.

Thefts from motor vehicles had increased, though vehicle theft had reduced.

There were to date in 2009-10 fewer instances of anti social behaviour, though the reductions are marginal.

Councillor T Young addressed the committee to explain that Community Safety was one of the Council's Strategic Priorities, and spoke of some of the Community Safety successes in the last year, including:

The SOS and Community Bus Days of Action The Safer Colchester pilot Encouraging feedback from officers supporting the Neighbourhood Action Panel process of improving attendances and better organisation.

Councillor Young said partnership working had improved immeasurably and the Council had an excellent relationship with Essex Police.

Councillor Young told the committee that the Council had served its first 'Closure Notice (Order)' on a private landlord tenanted dwelling. Councillor Young circulated the Closure Order to the panel. Councillor Young was confident that the order would be enforced by the Magistrate Court. Councillor Young agreed to circulate to the panel details of the background and press notice in respect of this order.

It was also confirmed that Colchester was the only authority in Essex where the Community Safety Team was based at the local police station, an initiative well thought of and appreciated

inside and outside the borough.

CS Newcomb responded to Councillor Hogg in respect of the perceived rise in the average age group of drink related cases of anti social behaviour (ASB) in the St. Anne's Ward. CS Newcomb said he did not have any statistics to confirm this perception, but that further research was needed and would be fed back directly to Neighbourhood Action Panels. CS Newcomb did confirm the trend and problem of young people drinking to excess before visiting the Town Centre. A crime analysis was required to determine why youngsters do this and determine a way of preventing this from happening.

Superintendent Gwillim said alcohol with young people had been a problem for a number of years, so there could be a natural assumption that these people are getting older and getting involved in alcohol related ASB. It was a fact that the average age of people diagnosed with liver sclerosis was going down.

In response to Councillor Barlow, CS Newcomb said that whilst there had been a significant decrease in violent crime, domestic violence had increased locally and nationally. Special units at Tendring and Colchester are tasked with addressing these issues. The target percentages for reducing the perceptions of ASB are based on people who tick 'high values' in surveys, and who expect it to decrease if we are successful in reducing instances of ASB, so the aim was to reduce the perception of ASB amongst residents. DS Newcomb confirmed that more officers are present on the ground and their work is better targeted than ever before, with innovative ways of working with new technology introduced. Councillor Young explained that there are now Street Wardens covering the whole of the borough.

Both Councillor J Young and Taylor acknowledged their appreciation of the partnership and what it had achieved, with Councillor Young saying the relationship and communication between the Council and Essex Police had improved immeasurably. Councillor Young did express a request for more attention to be given to producing good news stories to local residents and for more to be done to allay fears of residents.

Councillor Arnold asked that the Council's Communications Team consider publishing an article in the Courier on good news stories, not just about reducing crime but to help towards improving the resident's perception of crime.

In discussions with the committee, DS Newcomb said residents needed to be encouraged to report all instances of crime. Whilst there may be a common perception that "if the Police cannot do anything about a crime why bother to report it", DS Newcomb said he would be dismayed if improvements in targets was as a result of not reporting crime, saying all serious offences should be reported as this information provides an accurate data base of information that allows the police to more intelligently target patrols and resources, and any crime involving bodily contact provides forensic opportunities.

Councillor Sykes said that Stanway Parish Council did not support the West Colchester Neighbourhood Action Panel as it never received feedback or progress on issues that had been raised. Councillor T Young said he would discuss this issue with the appropriate officers.

In response to Councillor Willetts about the concerns of the large geographical area of the Constable Neighbourhood Action Panel and the long journeys needed by some residents to attend meetings, Councillor Young said he would speak to the Chair of the panel and the Head of Street Services to determine if this situation could be improved. Councillor Young did say there are fifteen panels covering the borough, the number that was felt adequate at the time of the panels review by Councillor Henshall as Portfolio Holder in 2007.

In response to Councillor Willetts, DS Newcomb said the crime detection rates are those provided under caution, during reprimands and defendants admitting extra offences in court. In respect of Credit Card Fraud (CCF), DS Newcomb said the instances of reported CCF are only a fraction of the actual number of instances. The Police will deal with CCF if reported, though he said it was difficult to get evidence from the financial institutions to help prosecutions.

Councillor Arnold thanked guests and officers for attending the meeting and contributing to what was a meaningful discussion.

RESOLVED that the committee considered and noted the current work and progress of the Colchester Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership in developing a safer Colchester.



This report considers the current contribution of the Safer Colchester Partnership and the partnership's role in achieving effective crime reduction and increased community safety.

1. Action required

1.1 To invite the Crime and Disorder Committee to consider the current work and progress of the Safer Colchester Partnership (SCP) formerly known as the Crime & Disorder Reduction Partnership.

2. **Reason for report**

- 2.1 Under the Crime and Disorder (Overview and Scrutiny) Regulations 2009 the panel is required to meet once a year to review and scrutinise decisions made, or other action taken, in connection with the discharge by the responsible authorities of their statutory crime and disorder reduction functions as the committee considers appropriate.
- 2.2 The Crime and Disorder Act 1998 places a statutory duty on every local authority to work with partner agencies to develop and implement strategies for tackling crime and disorder. The Chief Officer Group responsible for meeting this statutory duty is known as the Responsible Authorities Group (RAG). The current RAG partnership consists of the Borough Council, Police Service, County Council, Primary Care Trust, Probation Service, Colchester Borough Homes, Essex Drug & Alcohol Team, Police Authority and Essex Fire & Rescue. The group elects a chairperson each year which is currently lan Vipond, Executive Director, CBC.
- 2.3 Under Section 17 of the 1998 Act, Colchester Borough Council has a statutory duty to 'exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it can to prevent crime and disorder'.
- 2.4 The Minister for Policing and Criminal Justice, Nick Herbert, confirmed in the House of Commons recently that Community Safety Partnerships continue to be seen as important to delivering crime reduction with an emphasis on delivering actions, whilst working alongside the new Police and Crime Commissioners.

3. Background information

3.1 <u>The Role of the Safer Colchester Partnership (SCP)</u>

The SCP partnership continues to explore new opportunities to work more closely with other agencies and community groups to effectively reduce crime.

The overriding principle is that no one agency can reduce crime on its own and only by working collectively together can we make Colchester safer than it already is.

- 3.2 Colchester Borough Council and the police have a joint CBC and Safer Colchester Partnership (SCP) Team based within Colchester Police station that promotes one of the strongest examples of joint working in Essex and the UK. The team also works closely with both council and Colchester Borough Homes ASB teams who are critical to delivering reductions in anti-social behaviour across the borough.
- 3.3 The Colchester SCP structure, list of Action Groups, partner agencies and management chart is attached in Appendix **A** and shows the significant complexity of inter agency working necessary to promote and deliver a safer Colchester. Increasingly greater co-operation has been achieved with sharing human and financial resources between Colchester, Tendring and Braintree Community Safety Partnerships particularly when delivering joint crime reduction conferences, training and seminars.
- 3.4 Each year the SCP produces a detailed document called a Strategic Assessment of Crime that analyses wide ranging crime data, results of adult and young people consultations, community cohesion, counter terrorism, partnership data, hot spot crime areas, Public Service Agreements 2008-2011, LAA 2 and other borough or government targets. The Strategic Assessment frames the following year's performance and crime reduction targets known as an Annual Partnership Plan the key priorities for 10-11 and headline crime data is attached in appendix **B**.

3.5 Integrated Offender Management Units

The previous government set new additional targets for CSP's for reducing re-offending and having a key role in developing Integrated Offender Management Units (IOM) which will bring together into one building all those agencies responsible for offenders and reducing re-offending. The new coalition has voiced its support for IOM's given the government's aims to reduce the prison population as a result of which the SCP will have an integral role of developing the new service locally.

3.6 National Performance Indicator (NI35

Over the last year a National Performance Indicator (NI35) lead by Colchester Borough Council has been a priority service for the council linked to preventing radicalisation and promoting community cohesion through faith and culture. The Audit Commission outcome for NI35 is a score of between one (lowest) to five (highest) with Colchester achieving a level of three in just one year. The work of the council and SCP in delivering NI35 in Colchester is seen as only one of six in the Eastern Region, and the only one in Essex, as being an example of best practice.

3.7 <u>SCP Team</u>

To manage, and deliver the complex partnership working agenda in Colchester, there are currently five posts within the combined CBC/SCP Community Safety Team. These posts are:

a) One permanent full time council post consisting of a Community Safety Co-ordinator who manages and co-ordinates all the strategies, roles, policies, functions and responsibilities of the CBC/SCP team and partnership working across the borough

- b) One permanent full time council Senior Community Safety Officer which is funded from savings made in 2007 against two former full time council posts within the Community Partnerships Team
- c) One full time SCP Admin Assistant on a fixed term contract until November 2011. This post is funded from government funding.
- d) One full time SCP Community Safety Officer on a fixed term contract until March 2011. This post is funded from government funding.
- e) One part time Prevent Office (Counter Terrorism) on a fixed term contract until March 2011. This post is funded from government funding.

3.8 <u>Some SCP Successes</u>

Colchester SCP relies on a highly complex network of partner agencies and project delivery which is often viewed by other Community Safety Partnerships as setting the benchmark for innovation, positive partnership working and crime reduction. The excellence of the SCP partnership working in Colchester has led to a number of firsts in the county some of which are:

- a. North East Essex Multi-Faith Forum (as part of NI35 Prevent) which has markedly improved our understanding and links into faith groups, minority ethnic groups and diverse cultural groups that supports greater community cohesion and crime reduction.
- b. Neighbourhood Policing
- c. 15 Neighbourhood Action Panels
- d. Keep Project that targets 20 of the most prolific drug misusers which has resulted in a minimum 60% reduction in their re-offending
- e. SOS and Community Engagement Bus every Friday and Saturday night that has treated 1,100 plus adults and young people in two years which would have normally been taken to A&E. The youngest person treated is 13 the oldest 78
- f. Colchester Business Against Crime, Designated Public Place Order that Police Officers report has made a significant impact upon their ability to remove alcohol from people acting in a disorderly manner
- g. Crime Reduction 'Toolkits' that are the first of their kind in the UK to identify exactly what tasks SCP partners agencies can do to collectively reduce crime
- 3.9 There are two special projects worth highlighting this year which are the Community Days of Action and Safer Colchester Project. Both of these projects will be expected to have a significant role to play in delivering community based crime reduction in Colchester over the coming years. Central to both projects is the high visibility, high impact and intense services delivered to local communities who see actions not words as making a difference to their communities.

3.10 Community Days of Action (CDOA)

CDOA, funded by the SCP and LAA monies has been delivered on six occasions to date and focuses on one intensive day of action through a mix of six key themes which are:

- a) Enforcement from 5.00am to 4.00pm involving drug raids, TV licensing evasion, benefit fraud, DVLA car tax and insurance checks, removing abandoned vehicles, targeting hot spot ASB areas, serving police warrants on known offenders and disrupting offenders criminal activities
- b) Council Services involving additional street cleaning, clearing dumped rubbish, cleaning graffiti and fly-tipping, improving parks and

recreational areas of litter and glass, clearing back over hanging foliage

- c) Public & Business Consultation involving visits to homes and businesses providing crime reduction advice/leaflets, and seeking views of local residents on priorities for Neighbourhood Action Panels, crime reduction and community safety
- d) County Council involving repairing street lighting, damaged roads or paths, cutting back overhanging foliage
- e) Community and partner agency engagement involving community payback and youth offending restorative justice projects i.e. painting over graffiti, clearing paths, rebuilding fences, decorating community centres, SOS Bus services, community cohesion projects, health care checks, fire safety checks/advice, benefits and housing advice,
- f) Youth Engagement involving youth services, sporting facilities, accessing community centres and projects to keep young people occupied
- 3.11 Safer Colchester Project

The focus of this project was to create a model which is both innovative and encompasses new ways of working that will make Colchester an even safer place to live, increase quality of life for communities and reduce the fear of crime. Due to the positive strength of partnership working delivered by the SCP Colchester was chosen to undertake this county project that in effect delivers the CDOA over an extended three month period targeting

- Reducing crime
- Reducing the fear of crime
- Reducing anti-social behaviour
- Increasing community confidence
- 3.12 The project was funded to the sum of £99,920 primarily through the Safer Essex Partnership with additional funding or human resources from the Safer Colchester Partnership and partner agencies. There have been remarkable reductions in asb, youth nuisance, decreased crime and much greater community engagement which impacts on local confidence levels and the view that practical actions are being taken to make local communities safer. A review and assessment of the project will be completed in late September/October 2010 that will inform how best to take the project forward in Colchester and across Essex.

4 Further sections

4.1 The CBC/SCP Community Safety Co-ordinator is responsible for administering and managing, on behalf of the SCP, all Home Office and partner agency funding targeted at crime reduction and community safety. Crime reduction targets are used to determine an annual spending plan that is monitored by chief officers and senior managers who receive regular reports on the evaluation of projects to ensue effective service delivery, value for money and the achievement of performance management outcomes.

5 Strategic Plan references

- 5.1 This work directly contributes to the council's Strategic Plan for 2009-2012 objectives for community safety.
- 6 Consultation

6.1 Consultation is an ongoing process and will increase markedly linked to the importance of Neighbourhood Action Panels and the development of Annual Crime Reduction Plans.

7 Publicity Considerations

7.1 All publicity tries to achieve a positive reflection of the Safer Colchester Partnership, police and council as partners working together rather than any one individual agency.

8 Financial implications

- 8.1 The SCP, like every agency, is facing very difficult and challenging financial times ahead with an immediate 32% cut in SCP funding, 29.2% in Counter Terrorism (Prevent) and 50% in LAA1 Performance Reward Grant monies during 2010. This is additional to partner agencies having to reduce their contributions and other budgets no longer ringfenced and protected by government. Currently, and this may reduce further after the government spending review is announced in October 2010, the SCP funding for 2010-2011 will be:
 - a) £117,791 Home Office Area Based Grant (ABG) down from £149,830 in 2009-2010.
 - b) £77,022 Police Basic Command Unit Fund (BCU) that Colchester police kindly use to support the work of the SCP. The police also provide in kind all office accommodation for the CBC/SCP Team. The BCU fund was removed from ringfenced status by government recently which may place it at risk of significant cuts
 - c) £6,500 from Colchester Borough Council.
 - d) £4,500 from Essex County Council down from £6,500 in 2009-2010
 - e) £5,000 from Essex Police Community Grants Eastern (Colchester & Tendring) Division
 - f) £5,000 from Essex Fire & Rescue Service which is now under review
 - g) No funding from Essex Police Authority (second homes council tax) down from £38,400 in 2009-2010
- 8.2 Recent and sudden reductions in government funding for Community Safety Partnerships of 32% during 2010 and a total of 48% for Colchester over the last four years will result in a comprehensive review of all SCP funding, projects, commitments and posts in October/November 2010. The review will also consider the impact of reductions in funding for LAA 2 crime reduction projects and Counter Terrorism (Prevent).
- 8.3 The Safer Colchester Partnership has attracted inward investment of approximately £1,250,000 pounds over the last 10 years to combat all forms of crime and make Colchester even safer. The funding has supported many initiatives including domestic abuse, SOS Bus, violent crime, street lighting, CBC and Crime Partnership CCTV, alcohol misuse, counter terrorism, drug misuse, repeat victims of crime, burglary, anti-social behaviour, 15 Neighbourhood Action Panels, car theft, faith, cultural, community or voluntary groups and business crime.
- 8.4 Partnership working will be more critical than ever before with an emphasis on innovative and radical joint working key to sustaining the SCP and its many successes. This will require exploring greater use of cross boundary / agency working, shared human resources, new roles, changed and possibly fewer priorities, shared places of work and or employment contracts.

9 Human Rights Implications

9.1 There are no specific human rights implications.

10. Equality and Diversity implications

- 10.1 The work of the SCP takes into account the diverse nature of the borough by developing an understanding of the needs of different communities. This is done through the Strategic Assessment of Crime, 15 Neighbourhood Action Panels, North Essex Multi-Faith Group and the Hate Crimes Panel. The partnership's work to improve community safety is intended to promote equal access to a good quality of life for all residents.



As can be seen from the table below Colchester has consistently achieved a downward reduction in 'all crime'. For the period up to Feb' 2010 'all crime' is showing a further 9.7% **reduction**.



Projections indicate that the District will record 3% less offences for the year 2009 - 2010 than were recorded for the previous financial year. By March 2010 offence levels are projected to be between 873 and 915 per month with total recorded offence levels for 2009 – 2010 between 11,071 and 11,234.

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
