The Committee will usually convene immediately following the conclusion of the Strategic Overview and Scrutiny Panel.

The Committee deals with

The review and scrutiny of decisions made, or other actions taken, in connection with the discharge by the responsible authorities of their crime and disorder functions, and to make reports and recommendations to the Council or the Cabinet with respect to the discharge of those functions.

The role of the Crime and Disorder Committee

The Committee shall meet to review or scrutinise decisions or other actions taken in connection with the functions conferred to the Committee, these being, a strategy for the reduction of crime and disorder in the Borough and a strategy for combating the misuse of drugs in the borough.

The Committee has to meet at least once in every twelve month period.

The Committee may co-opt persons to serve on the Committee who are members of the public, employees, officers or members of responsible authorities, for example, the Council, Essex County Council, Essex Police Authority, Essex Fire and Rescue Authority and the Essex Probation Service. Executive members of the Council may not be co-opted to the Committee. Co-opted persons shall not be entitled to vote on any matter, unless the Committee so determines.

The work of the Crime and Disorder Committee

An annual review of the Safer Colchester Partnership Strategy will be a year on year substantive report to be considered by the Committee.

Any Member of Colchester Borough Council may give written notice to the Scrutiny Officer (on behalf of the Head of Corporate Services) that they wish an item to be included on the agenda of the Committee in relation to a local crime and disorder matter. If the matter is considered a local crime and disorder matter, the item will be included on the first available agenda of the Committee.

A crime and disorder matter is a matter involving anti-social behaviour or other behaviour adversely affecting the local environment, or the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances.

The Committee once it has considered a local crime and disorder matter shall consider whether or not to make a report to the Cabinet or Council, and if it decides not to, shall notify the Councillor concerned of its decision(s) and the reason(s) for it.

If the Committee decides to report to the Cabinet or Council, it will provide a copy of the report to the Councillor concerned and the responsible authorities and co-operating persons or bodies as appropriate.

then the interest need only be declared if the Councillor intends to speak on that item.

If a Councillor declares a personal interest they must also consider whether they have a prejudicial interest. If they have a prejudicial interest they must leave the room for that item.

If a Councillor wishes to make representations on an item on which they have a prejudicial interest they may do so if members of the public are allowed to make representations. In such circumstances a Councillor must leave the room immediately once they have finished speaking.

An interest is considered to be prejudicial if a member of the public with knowledge of the relevant facts would reasonably regard it as so significant that it is likely to prejudice the Councillor's judgement of the public interest.

Councillors should consult paragraph 7 of the Meetings General Procedure Rules for further guidance.

Title Safer Colchester Partnership

This report outlines the current work and objectives of the Safer Colchester Partnership.

1. Action required

1.1 To invite the Crime and Disorder Committee to scrutinise the work of the Safer Colchester Partnership (SCP).

2. Reason for report

2.1 To enable the Crime and Disorder Committee to scrutinise the work of the Safer Colchester Partnership.

3. Background information

- 3.1 The funding for Community Safety Partnerships for 2011-12 received from the 'Home Office Community Safety Fund' was reduced by more than 50%. In 2010-11 the Safer Colchester Partnership received £121,372 and in 2011-12 this was reduced to £49,742.00.
- 3.2 In addition, the agencies that make up the partnership: Essex Fire, Essex Police, NHS and Essex Probation amongst them, are receiving cuts to their budgets with subsequent restructuring of staff and cutting of services to meet the reduced budget. For instance, Essex Police has significantly restructured its service and members are due to receive a presentation on this at this meeting.
- 3.3 Therefore, the big challenge for the partnership in 2011-12 is to maintain its positive partnership working relationships and practical outcomes with the reduction in resources (see below).

4. The partnership's work in 2011-12

- 4.1 The priorities for the partnership are identified through the Strategic Assessment of Crime and with reference to the priorities of the Safer Essex Partnership.
- 4.2 The partnership has four priorities for 2011-12 (the full partnership plan is attached at Appendix A):
 - to address domestic abuse
 - to reduce reoffending through integrated offender management
 - to address alcohol misuse
 - to reduce crime and the fear of crime

4.3 Addressing domestic abuse

Domestic abuse is a violent offence and during 2011-12 the partnership will be supporting the work of the Women's Refuge, in particular by improving and relaunching the Sanctuary Scheme, organising and holding a Domestic Abuse Conference for practitioners and launching a new publicity campaign. In addition the partnership will support the Women's Support Officer in the Integrated Domestic Abuse Programme. This programme works with offenders to address their offending behaviour and the Women's Support Officer provides support to the victims ensuring their views are represented and they are kept up to date with the perpetrators progress.

4.4 There is a new duty from April 2011 on community safety partnerships to carry out a Domestic Homicide Review in the case of a death due to domestic abuse. The partnership will be working throughout the year to put in place a review process akin to a Serious Case Review for such an eventuality.

4.5 Integrated Offender Management Units (IOM's)

In line with Government guidance, during 2011-12 the partnership is required to develop an Integrated Offender Management approach. This will bring together local agencies to develop a multi-agency problem solving approach to offenders. There is discussion currently to set up a Colchester and Tendring IOM Steering Group to manage the local IOM scheme.

4.6 To address alcohol misuse

This year there is particular emphasis on reducing alcohol related crime. The partnership is looking to explore better information sharing with hospitals to share information on admissions due to drinking. In addition, the partnership will be working with Trading Standards to deliver Challenge 25. This initiative, due to start in November, will target underage sales of alcohol and tobacco.

- 4.7 In addition to this planned work, the partnership can respond to issues that arise during the year. The Tasking & Management Group is responsible for monitoring the action plan and dealing with any issues that arise out of it. It can undertake focused problem solving around a specific issue.
- 4.8 For instance, street drinkers became an issue that was referred to this group during the last year. The group has instigated a pilot project, along with partners in the voluntary sector in order to test a possible long term solution to the problem.
- 4.9 Throughout 2011-12 the partnership will also continue to deliver its regular projects to tackle crime.

Crucial Crew – this project delivered personal and safety education to over 1600 Year 6 children from 55 schools across the borough. The safety scenarios included road, crime and anti-social behaviour, fire, internet, rail and drugs and alcohol.

Community Days of Action and Safer Colchester Project – We plan to undertake 3 this year between April 11 and March 12. One has

already taken place in harbour ward with the largest joint enforcement operation to date for a CDOA event. The Safer Colchester Project seeks to deliver longer term results following the initial day of action.

NAPs – the Neighbourhood Action Panels continue with their work of targeting local problems with joint problem solving. The recent police review of NAPs resulted in the recommendations below:

- Consider a name change suggested 'Neighbourhood meetings'
- Single marketing standard
- Community to vote for priorities under the Chair who should be a police officer however, issues can be brought via other routes such as door knocking
- Time frame for meetings: monthly, 6 weekly or bi-monthly
- Neighbourhood meeting rather than ward level meetings. This
 might encourage more community attendance and maximise
 efficient use of officer/PCSO time
- 1 police officer / PCSO to attend rather than 2/3
- clear guidance should be made available to clarify roles involved in co-ordinating meetings.

These recommendations will be considered by the NAP Chairs in their annual meeting in September.

Firebreak – this project targets young people aged between 13-17 years who are at risk of exclusion from school, or are known to the police or at risk in some other way. The project is a 5 day course aimed at improving self esteem, self discipline and responsibility. One session has run already this year with 6 attendees. Another is due to run later in the year.

5 Strategic Plan references

5.1 This work directly contributes to the council's Strategic Plan for 2009-2012 objectives for community safety.

6 Consultation

6.1 There is an annual public meeting and the NAPs and CDOAs provide a number of opportunities for communities to engage with the partnership.

7 Publicity Considerations

7.1 All publicity tries to achieve a positive reflection of the safe Colchester Town and Borough that we have and the work of the partnership; police and council as partners working together rather than any one individual agency to continue to try and reduce crime and ASB further.

8 Financial implications

8.2 It is expected that funding for the partnership's work will be reduce further in 2012-13 and it is currently unclear whether any funding will continue to come to local partnerships once Police Commissioners are in place. Therefore, during this financial year the partnership will be looking at where they can maintain the partnerships and projects they have built up without the funding they currently use.
